



## APPRENTICES WAGE LOSS BENEFITS

If you are an apprentice and you are injured while participating in on-the-job-training or in-school technical training, the wage loss benefits you receive as a result of your injury may be adjusted.

### What amount of wage loss benefits will I be entitled to?

Initially the Workers Compensation Board of Manitoba (WCB) will calculate your wage loss benefits based on standard practices. Please refer to the [Calculation of Wage Loss Benefits](#) fact sheet on our website for more information.

### Why would my wage loss benefits be adjusted if I am an apprentice?

If the WCB finds that the wages earned at the time of injury do not fairly represent your loss of earnings, we will periodically increase your benefits based on what your earnings would have been if you had continued your apprenticeship training. We do this because the income of an apprentice usually increases by specific amounts as they work towards their journeyman qualification.

If you are still receiving wage loss benefits one year after your injury, your wage loss benefits will be reviewed and adjusted to reflect what you would probably earn if you had not been injured.

### How are my benefits adjusted?

1. Initially, your average earnings will be calculated using the established wage and hours being worked for the stage of the apprenticeship you were in at the time of the injury.
2. On the first day of the month following the first anniversary of your injury, your average earnings will be increased to reflect the wage you would have been earning if you had not been injured.
3. Your average earnings will continue to be adjusted annually in accordance with the mandated or scheduled increases you would have received as an apprentice if you had not been injured.
4. Once your average earnings reach the prevailing wage/salary of a starting journeyman or equivalent, future adjustments will be made annually in accordance with the indexing provisions of *The Workers Compensation Act*.
